

## WHAT A NICE CRAG! (First of, I hope, a regular new feature)

Rog & I have been exploring crags near Edinburgh since we have been visiting our daughter there. We came upon a little gem last week. It could be a good spot to pause en route home when the Highlands are suffering unmentionable weather.

### Hawkcraig, Aberdour

This is a small sea cliff (25m routes) facing south; I reckon you could climb there on a sunny day at any time of the year. It is just north of Edinburgh, 6Km from M90 North end of Forth Road Bridge and a 5 minute walk from the parking.

The crag is tidal, but some routes can be reached by abseil at high tide. It is quartz dolerite, and provides lovely sharp and incut holds and just enough cracks for gear. We did a couple of excellent VSs (*Pain Pillar* is a minor classic) and a nice S in our short visit. It is described as 'an especially nice crag for VS climbers', but there were all grades.

Details of the crag and 15 routes can be downloaded on <u>www.scotclimb.org.uk</u> or lots more can be found in the Lowland Outcrops guide book.

#### **IBBETH PERIL July 7**

The cave entrance is in the streambed of a beautiful little ravine just to the side of a waterfall above a very deep pool. We were glad to get underground as it was a real scorcher of a day and after a short crawl we entered the main chamber. The chamber is of very impressive dimensions, the floor being made up of huge collapsed slabs that used to be roof! Which was slightly thought provoking. We crawled through boulders at the far end hoping to find a pitch down to a sump only to find another equally large chamber (not on the survey). Then we realised we had done a complete 180° and come back out further down in the main chamber. We then explored down through boulders by the waterfall, climbing down the best part of 30 feet of jammed blocks. (I guess the chamber was originally a wide bedding, then every so often a new layer of rock would drop off the roof to take its turn in being eroded). We found a passage with a nice solid roof that led off down to a sump. We still couldn't find the confusingly named "upstream downstream passage" that leads to Ibbeth Peril II. According to the survey and description it seemed to go right under the main chamber and back under or past the entrance. The book and the cave just didn't make much sense. We tried to find the entrance to Ibbeth Peril II on the surface - only 50 feet away - but this is well known for being difficult to find - we didn't.
